Car crashes are a leading cause of death for children ages 1-13.

• Roughly every 30 seconds, a car crash involving a child under 13 occurs.

• In 2017, 675 children under the age of 13 were killed in car accidents. That's nearly two per day.

Car seats can dramatically increase your child's chance of survival in a serious crash.

• In passenger cars, car seats reduce the risk of fatal injury for infants by 71% and for toddlers by 54%.

• In light trucks, car seats reduce the risk of fatal injury for infants by 58% and for toddlers by 59%.

• In 2017, car seats saved the lives of an estimated 312 children under the age of 5.



Know Your Car Seats



• Rear-facing car seats (example: Seats A and B in depiction above) are recommended for children under a year old up to age 3.

• Forward-facing car seats (example: Seat C in depiction above) are recommended for children between the ages of 1-7, or until they reach the height and weight limit allowed by the manufacturer.

• Booster seats (example: Seat D in depiction above) are recommended for children between the ages of 4-12, or until they fit a seat belt properly.



Know Your Car Seats

• Once your child has graduated from the booster seat, it is important to keep them in the back seat until at least age 13!

• Make sure your child's car seat is up-to-code: every state has <u>different</u> <u>legal requirements.</u>

• Learn the expiration date of your child's car seat: car seats should be replaced every 6-10 years.
